But in 2014, he was still in charge; and it was a good year for Center for Families. As Mike put it in a letter to his friends and family:

"From November 2013 through October 2014 I enjoyed a reprieve filled with some recovery of body, spirit and joy of life. Now in a reduced state, a somewhat broken form of my former vibrant self, I'd say I was at about 70% of my former self. I was glad to be able to do many things like grill out, work with the flowers, and mow the lawn on my tractor. For the most part, life was good. I am so thankful for the prayers and support I received from so many during my darkest days, surely that is what pulled me through. Janet, Emily, and Colin were nothing but outstanding in their love, acceptance, patience and help through the nightmare."

Respite Center

Provides respite and crisis child care 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to families experiencing high levels of stress. Call: 608.244.5700.

Respite = Relief

Respite Center: 457 families with 832 children. 199 first time users. 26,064 hours of crisis and emergency child care in 2014.

- The Respite Center provides licensed and accredited care for children from birth through age 14 in our home-like facility. Parents are given relief and the knowledge that the community cares. Children are safe and cherished in a beautiful setting.
- 4,973 support contacts were made and 2,707 service hours were logged by the Respite
 Center social workers. Service hours include new intakes, phone contacts, and face-toface support regarding safety, housing & income distress, medical & legal issues, and relief
 support to help stabilize the family.



Parent Support Groups

You are your childs first teacher. Be the best teacher you can be.

Strong Parents = Strong Families

Parents' Place: 99 individuals served in 2014.

Court Ordered Parent Education (CORE): 23 families served in 2014.

- Parents Place provides weekly opportunities for parents to come together and learn
 parenting skills and share their parenting experiences. 98% of parents reported that the
 group is helpful to them as parents, that they experienced a reduction in isolation, and that
 their knowledge of child development was increased. Offered in English and Spanish.
- 100% of participants in the Court Ordered Parent Education Program reported increased knowledge about their core protective capacities including child development and alternatives to physical discipline.



Home Visiting

Bringing Help Home

Welcome Baby: 168 families. Parents and Children Together (PACT): 14 families. Neighborhood Parent Aide (NPA): 37 families

- The Welcome Baby Program, using the Parents as Teachers curriculum, enriches the
 parent-child interaction and well-being by using a development-centered approach.
 97% of parents report an increase in their understanding of their child's development and
 learning needs
- Parents and Children Together works with parents who have cognitive disabilities, providing them support and education in their homes until their children reach adulthood.
- Neighborhood Parent Aide provides weekly in-home parenting education, using the Love and Logic curriculum to address protective capacities identified by Dane County Protective Services



Early Childhood Education

When your children play and read with you they learn important social emotional skills.

Help children get a headstart!

Play & Learn: 600 families with children between the ages of 0-5 served in 2014. Parent-Child Home Program: 150 children served in 2014.

- 91% of parents/caregivers reported an increase in understanding of their child's learning through play due to their participation in one of the 7 Play and Learn sessions held weekly throughout Dane County.
- The Parent-Child Home Program is an evidence-based, research validated early childhood literacy, parent support, and school readiness program. 91% of the participating children show an increase in positive behavior traits as measured with the Cognitive Behavioral Therapy evaluation.

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
